WHAT IS A PBI?

Predominantly Black Institutions (PBIs) are central to educational access, serving African American college students nationwide across 67 institutions. To earn this distinction, campuses must welcome at least 40% African American enrollment and support 50% low-income or first-generation students.

Here at CSU, our pride is rooted in our people—68% African American students and 38% are first-generation scholars. As we aim ever higher in teaching, research, and service, it is the collective drive and dedication of our students, staff, and faculty that propel our university forward, exemplifying what it truly means to put equity in motion.

Breaking Barriers, Advancing Knowledge: CSU Joins the Nation's Research Powerhouses

Chicago State University has been officially recognized as a Carnegie-designated Research University in the 2025 Carnegie Classifications, a milestone that elevates CSU into the ranks of distinguished national research institutions. This prestigious designation acknowledges both significant research activity and CSU's steadfast commitment to providing transformative, high-impact opportunities for students from all backgrounds.

Unique among its peers, CSU has achieved this honor while preserving its open-access mission and expanding its research enterprise. The new classification is awarded to universities that demonstrate substantial investment in research and development—spending at least \$2.5 million annually on research and development.

Building on strengths across multiple disciplines, CSU's innovation is rooted in inclusive excellence and deep community engagement. As President Scott affirms, this achievement is not just a milestone but a demonstration of CSU's leadership in discovery and service. The university remains dedicated to expanding research that fosters opportunity and addresses critical challenges both locally and globally.

RISE ACADEMY

RISE Academy Delivers Breakthrough Results and Expands Pathways to College Success

Chicago State University's *RISE* Academy is setting new benchmarks for student achievement, affordability, and inclusive support. Now in its fourth year, *RISE* Academy provides full first-year tuition, fees, textbooks, laptops, and comprehensive wraparound resources to scholars—empowering students to thrive both in and out of the classroom.

The results speak for themselves: *RISE* Academy students have a nearly 20% higher rate of completing their first and second years of college compared to peers. The 2024-25 academic year has seen a 14% increase in *RISE* enrollment, underscoring strong demand and growing impact. Despite considerable FAFSA delays and widespread financial need (90% of *RISE* scholars are Pell Grant eligible), CSU's holistic approach through *RISE* and the Cougar Commitment strategy is driving meaningful progress in college retention and completion.

Scholars benefit from summer bridge programs, personalized academic and well-being support, career preparation, and practical tools—from tutoring to campus technology upgrades—that help ease the transition to university life. CSU's commitment extends far beyond the first year, offering targeted grants, degree planning, and support networks so every student can cross the finish line. This is education without barriers—fully student-centered and data-driven.

RISE Graduate Student Spotlights



Malachi Spells, B.S. History Education, 2024

When Malachi Spells and his twin brother started at Chicago State University in 2020, the pandemic and financial challenges weighed heavily on their family. CSU wasn't on their radar

at first, but with both their mother and grandparents as proud alumni, they found their way to the *RISE* Academy program at the perfect time.

That first year brought virtual classes, essential financial support, and uncertainty—but *RISE* replaced worry with belonging. "It really prepared me for college and took away a lot of stress," Malachi recalls.

RISE went beyond academic and financial help, connecting the brothers with internships and opportunities to return as mentors. It also gave them the chance to compete on CSU's track and field team—a dream they might have missed otherwise.

Now, Malachi is pursuing a master's in history education and plans to attend law school to shape educational policy, continuing his family's legacy. His brother is now at Publicis, a CSU partner. "*RISE* is more than financial aid and college prep," Malachi says. "It's a community that supports your journey and opens doors in unexpected ways."

He encourages new students to embrace *RISE*: "You'll find people who truly care about your future—and then you can give back too. It's an experience that will change your life."



Christabel Addo, B.S.N., Graduated with Honors, May 2024

When Christabel Addo first heard about Chicago State University during a high school presentation, she was drawn

to its mission as a PBI and strong student support. After applying, she joined the *RISE* Academy—a program she now credits with transforming her life.

RISE offered more than a summer course and first-year funding. It provided mentorship, academic and wellness support, and a close-knit community. With her mentors' help, Christabel landed an internship after freshman year—an uncommon opportunity for new students.

"We had so much support from the mentors, not just academically, but for our mental health and well-being," she recalls. "That support was instrumental through the uncertainty of the pandemic." Her dedication earned her more scholarships and the chance to focus on her goals.

When new financial barriers emerged before entering CSU's nursing program, the *RISE* director helped her secure additional scholarships—a time she now calls "the summer my life turned around."

Now a registered nurse in Massachusetts, Christabel proudly graduated debt-free and says *RISE* "is life-changing and does everything it promises—and more." Her advice for future *RISE* scholars: don't be afraid to seek help and embrace the support.

POWERING THE QUANTUM REVOLUTION:

CSU at the Forefront of Tomorrow's Careers

Chicago State University stands at the forefront of innovation in quantum science and microelectronics, delivering on its mission to build inclusive economic opportunity through advanced education. With new programs, targeted partnerships, and a strategic focus on workforce diversity, CSU is establishing itself as a launchpad for the future leaders of quantum technology and semiconductor manufacturing.



Accelerating Pathways into Quantum Careers



CSU is the only Predominantly Black Institution (PBI) in Illinois participating in the National Science Foundation's Quantum Leap Challenge Institute for Quantum Sensing for Biophysics and Bioengineering (QuBBE). The Quantum Sensing Summer Program, now in its third year, immerses high school students—most from underrepresented backgrounds—into real university labs. The program's impact is clear: enrollment has doubled, alumni are matriculating to top research universities, and students cite CSU's early exposure as the reason for pursuing STEM majors.

Beyond summer camps, CSU has implemented the Quantum Academy for high school teachers, developed a quantum technology certificate for college students, and helped shape the Illinois Quantum and Microelectronics Park being built near campus. The university's faculty are also national leaders: Dr. Valerie Goss, CSU's associate professor of chemistry, leads workforce development for QuBBE and has represented CSU's quantum programs at national NSF showcases.

Equity and Workforce Development in Microelectronics

CSU's commitment to emerging technologies is equally dynamic in microelectronics. As a core member of the Illinois Semiconductor Workforce Network, CSU partners with UIUC, UIC, IIT, Argonne National Labs, and community colleges statewide to address the critical national demand for semiconductor technicians. Supported by \$1.2 million in federal and private grants, CSU's microelectronics experiential program, led by Dr. Moussa Ayyash, provides industry-standard training and hands-on experience in microelectronics fabrication and semiconductor manufacturing.

With a history of producing graduates ready for global STEM innovation, CSU anchors equity in workforce development. More than 90% of students receive need-based aid; the student body is majority Black and Latinx, and many are first in their families to attend college. As projections estimate up to 191,000 jobs created in the Midwest quantum sector by 2035—with most open to workers with a bachelor's degree or technical training—CSU is uniquely positioned to move underrepresented students into these high-demand roles.

This work only grows with donor investment. Philanthropic support is essential to expanding scholarships, growing experiential learning, and opening more doors for CSU students to transform the region's innovation economy.

Chicago State University proudly celebrated its flourishing partnership with ComEd at the 2025 ComEd Scholars Recognition Event, honoring outstanding students in Computer Science, Physics, and Business. As the second cohort of ComEd Scholars at CSU was recognized, four exceptional Computer Science majors—Boris Mojsa, Yonathan Getachew, Kamia Johnson, and Osbaldo Gonzalez—were awarded scholarships, signaling the program’s ongoing growth and commitment.

The ComEd Scholars Program is designed to increase access to STEM careers for local university students by providing crucial financial support, mentorship from ComEd professionals, and internship opportunities with both ComEd and its parent company, Exelon. Attendance from ComEd CEO Gil Quiniones, Provost Sonja Feist-Price, CSU leadership, and alumni currently working at ComEd underscored the importance of this collaboration.

This expanding partnership highlights a shared dedication to student empowerment and equitable pathways into high-demand fields. By investing in scholarships and real-world professional experiences, ComEd and CSU are opening doors for underrepresented students, helping them build promising careers in STEM while strengthening the talent pipeline in the region.

Professor Delgado-Norris Advances Global Scholarship

CSU celebrates Professor Evelyne Delgado-Norris, Associate Professor of French and African Languages, on her selection for the January 2025 Overseas Faculty Development Seminar with the Council for American Overseas Research Centers. This prestigious, fully funded experience immersed Professor Delgado-Norris in India's academic and cultural life, enhancing CSU's dedication to international learning and cross-cultural insight. Professor Botanga Leads National STEM Diversity Initiative

Chicago State University has secured a \$3 million National Science Foundation (NSF) grant to establish the LSAMP National Coordination Hub. Led by Dr. Chris Botanga, the executive director for CSER and Professor of Genetics & Genomics, this first-of-its-kind project brings together CSU, Rutgers, ASU, UTEP, Argonne National Laboratory, and Sagefox Consulting to advance diversity, equity, and inclusion in STEM education and workforce development. The Hub will drive national collaboration, support faculty and mentoring programs, and elevate CSU's impact as a leader in broadening participation in STEM.

CSU Deepens National Impact with the Learning Assistant Model Through Two New NSF Awards

Chicago State University has received two new NSF grants—partnering with lead institutions Oakton College and Tufts University—to advance and study the Learning Assistant (LA) Model in STEM education. CSU faculty Drs. Jacquelyn Benchik-Osborne, Mel Sabella, and Andrea Van Duzor will help bring evidence-based teaching and professional development to two-year college and university settings, driving collaboration and teaching innovations nationwide. These projects build on CSU's leadership in LA Model implementation, fostering effective classroom engagement and expanding national best practices in teaching and learning.



Professor Salam Joins National AI and Astrophysics Institute

CSU has joined a \$20 million multi-institutional partnership, led by Northwestern University, to establish the NSF-Simons AI Institute for the Sky (SkAI). Funded by the NSF and Simons Foundation, the initiative focuses on advancing AI for astrophysics. Representing CSU, Dr. Mohammad Abdus Salam will collaborate with leading researchers. This prestigious partnership enhances CSU's research profile, offering students and faculty opportunities to engage in cutting-edge projects at the intersection of AI, astrophysics, and deep space exploration.



Dr. Ziglari Earns Honors for Special Education Research

Assistant Professor Dr. Leily Ziglari presented at SERA-2024 in San Antonio and at the Society of Scientific Studies of Reading (SSSR-2024) in Copenhagen, where she received an award for her conference presentation. Dr. Ziglari was also awarded a \$1,000 CTRE Faculty Development Grant in Spring 2024. Her recent scholarship includes publications in peer-reviewed academic journals, strengthening CSU's impact in special education research.



Dr. Fazal Showcases Immunology Innovation on Global Stage

Professor Nadeem Fazal presented 13 abstracts at the AAI Immunology 2025 Annual Conference in Hawaii and gave an oral talk at the Digital Medicine 4.0 conference in Azerbaijan, highlighting CSU's strengths in immune health, teaching innovation, and global research. A Fulbright Scholar and award-winning faculty, Dr. Fazal has over 116 scientific publications and continues to mentor and lead in the fields of immunology and biomedical sciences.



Dr. Yamani Joins FINRA HBCU Professorship Program

Associate Professor of Finance, Dr. Ehab Yamani, was selected to attend the prestigious FINRA 2025 HBCU Professorship Program this May, where he gained a comprehensive view of financial regulation, including FINRA's operations and its relationship with the SEC, and learned about the regulatory roles in U.S. finance. While attending FINRA's annual conference, Dr. Yamani engaged directly with FINRA's senior leadership, Board of Governors, and the Industry Diversity Advisory Committee. The program also supports CSU students by facilitating school visits, offering internship opportunities, and providing resources like study materials and exam vouchers for the Securities Industry Essentials (SIE) Exam, creating a direct pipeline from the classroom to promising careers in the financial services industry.

She recently represented CSU in Washington, D.C. at the State of the Union and Thurgood Marshall College Fund Leadership Institute, championing change on campus and beyond.

CSU Welcomes Mandela Fellow to Advance Disability Advocacy

Chicago State University is proud to welcome its first Mandela Washington Fellow, Hafsatou Diallo from Guinea, West Africa. Through YALI's Mandela Washington Fellowship, Hafsatou is partnering with CSU's College of Education and Global Engagement Office to craft a model for inclusive special education to bring back to her home country. As a leading advocate for children with disabilities and women in Guinea, her CSU experience includes engaging with local schools, educators, and officials, all designed to advance access and equity for students with disabilities in West Africa.



CSU Unites with Lawmakers for Equitable University Funding

Chicago State University students, faculty, alumni, and staff participated in Higher Education Advocacy Day at the State Capitol, joining hundreds from across Illinois to support public universities. Two students, Milan Taylor and Chana Staples, spoke during a rally and CSU representatives, including alumni lawmakers Rep. Nicholas Smith and Rep. Marcus Evans, met with state legislators and voiced the urgent need for equitable funding through the Adequate and Equitable Public University Funding Act (SB13/HB1581), highlighting the impact of a 46% decline in state investment since 2002.



Student Leaders Elevate Voices with Alumni Lawmaker

Chicago State University's Student Government Association, including SGA President Valencia Davis and SGA Vice President Kimberly Okyere, organized a Town Hall with Illinois State Representative and CSU alumnus Marcus Evans, providing a platform for students to engage directly with a state legislator. The event empowered students to discuss pressing issues—ranging from education to community investment—while Representative Evans shared legislative insights and encouraged open dialogue. This gathering underscored the impact of civic engagement and affirmed students' important role in influencing public policy within and beyond the university.



CSU Students Build Careers with Industry Advertising Partners

Thirteen Chicago State University students from Design, Business, Communications, Media Arts, and Theatre programs participated in an immersive, semester-long collaboration with Leo Burnett, Spark Foundry, and Arc Worldwide at their downtown offices. This partnership, centered on the Leo Burnett Pencil Project, provided hands-on experience in advertising strategy and campaign execution, with instruction shared between CSU faculty and leading industry professionals. Leo Burnett has committed further support through scholarship funding for Art & Design and CMAT students in the 2025-2026 Pencil Project, reflecting an ongoing effort to develop top creative talent and connect students with real-world opportunities.

COMMUNITY



University Village 95 Project Driving South Side Revitalization

Chicago State University is advancing the University Village 95 project, transforming campus land along 95th Street into a vibrant hub for student housing, retail, green spaces, and cultural celebration. CSU's mixed-use development aims to generate new jobs, stimulate local spending, and strengthen the South Side's economic future—all while prioritizing input and participation from the surrounding community.



Metra Breaks Ground on Major 95th Street Transit Upgrades to Expand Access

Metra has begun a \$56 million rehabilitation and expansion of the 95th St./Chicago State University Station, building a safer, more accessible gateway connecting the South Side, CSU, and the future University Village 95 development. This transformative project includes ADA upgrades, a new entrance, platform enhancements, and direct pathways to campus, with completion anticipated in 2027. The investment not only improves campus access but also strengthens CSU's role as a vital community anchor for education and economic growth.



CSU Hosts Second Annual Education Equity Conference

The Illinois Center for Education Equity at Chicago State University convened its second annual conference to address critical issues facing Illinois higher education, including a 37% drop in Black student enrollment in higher education over the past decade. The event featured an address by Illinois Board of Higher Education Chair Pranav Kothari on state education data, policy discussions with leaders from the General Assembly, TICAS, and Women Employed, a student panel highlighting early-start programs, and conversations on dual enrollment access. Additional panels explored corporate partnerships for student success and advocated for a new, equitable public university funding formula—reinforcing CSU's commitment to advancing opportunity through collaboration and policy change.



CSU Hosts Lecture Series on Wealth Creation and Business Success

During Black History Month, Chicago State University held two Presidential Lecture Series events spotlighting economic empowerment and entrepreneurship for the CSU community. The first event, "Unlocking Access to Wealth Creation," showcased Dean Derrick Collins' findings from the Illinois Black Business Survey and featured entrepreneur Pete Kadens, who discussed generating \$5B+ in value and over 7,000 jobs through ventures like SoCore Energy and Green Thumb Industries. The follow-up panel, "Unlocking Success as a Business Owner in Illinois," brought CSU alumni business owners Audrey Blinstrup, Spring Capers, and Cornelius Griggs together to share real-world strategies and inspiration for aspiring entrepreneurs.



Summer Camps and STEM Highlights at CSU

Chicago State University welcomed 141 youth ages 5–20 to six campus-based summer camps, focusing on high-impact activities and science learning. Standout offerings included the Health Professions Summer Camp, the NSF Quantum Sensing Summer Program, and a pre-freshman engineering and science course—experiences that led to new university enrollments and student awards at the NAACP national convention.



Bridging the Digital Divide for Chicago's South Side

The ABE-LINC program at CSU and NEIU empowers local residents with digital skills and internet connectivity through full-time navigators and hands-on training. Since March 2024, ABE-LINC trained 729 participants, distributed 724 devices, and partnered with Compudot to connect 176 families to the internet. Supported by an NTIA grant, the initiative targets improved digital access for underserved populations near CSU and across anchor communities of minority-serving institutions.

Faith for 500 Initiative Grows Future Cougars

In Spring 2025, CSU collaborated with Progressive and Salem Baptist churches through the Faith for 500 Initiative to deepen outreach among prospective students and alumni. With the support of Reverend Dr. Charlie Dates, these events connected the university with over 300 potential students and rekindled engagement with alumni—many of whom have since joined the CSU Alumni Association and contribute actively to university activities. CSU's team followed up with every interested student, resulting in four confirmed enrollments for Fall 2025. The university looks forward to building on these partnerships to welcome new students across all academic levels.

NextGen Summer Career Learning Academy Empowers Future Leaders

The NextGen Summer Career Learning Academy, jointly hosted by Chicago State University and Olive-Harvey College, guided 20 high school juniors and seniors through two weeks of career exploration in fields like healthcare, education, and technology. Students created LinkedIn profiles, attended professional workshops, and took part in hands-on activities—including STEM demonstrations and networking with college student leaders—which sparked new interests in teaching and dual enrollment at CSU.

Basketball Events Celebrate Local Partnerships

In February, CSU Athletics and External Affairs co-hosted special engagement events at the women's and men's basketball games, highlighting partnerships with valued community and corporate supporters. Honorees and guests enjoyed a VIP reception in the President's Suite, connecting with university leaders while watching the CSU Cougars in action. The events also welcomed local students, strengthening ties with neighboring communities.

Powerful Voices Drive National Focus on PBIs and Student Equity

Chicago State University played a leading role as the National Coalition of Predominantly Black Institutions brought together academic, nonprofit, corporate, and congressional leaders in Washington, D.C. to champion the 67 PBIs educating over 300,000 students nationwide. Thought leaders highlighted the urgent need to support Black student achievement and workforce development, while a coalition of 21 institutions celebrated a 22% federal funding increase. CSU also joined with the National Urban League to advance the national conversation on racial equity in higher education, reaffirming the university's commitment to creating life-changing opportunities for underrepresented students.

CSU Opens Satellite Location at Historic Gift of Hope Jackie D. Lynch Building

The Gift of Hope Organ and Tissue Donor Network, together with local partners, welcomed community members to an inspiring Open House at the historic Jackie D. Lynch Building, now home to several organizations dedicated to health equity and support. The event featured heartfelt reflections from leaders, including President Scott, emphasizing the building's historic roots and renewed purpose as a hub for outreach, healing, and hope. Gift of Hope CEO Dr. Harry Wilkins and community champions shared stories of perseverance and commitment, reinforcing the mission to eliminate transplant waitlists and create lasting impact through collaboration, education, and compassion.

Reimagining Healing and Justice in Illinois

Chicago State University hosted the Healing-Centered Illinois Task Force as it celebrated the completion and dissemination of its final report. Senate Bill 646 officially called for the creation the Task Force for a Healing-Centered Illinois in 2023. Supported by the Justice, Equity, and Opportunity(JEO) Initiative and led by Lt. Governor Juliana Stratton, the task force convened statewide experts to advance alignment among trauma-informed and healing-focused policies. These efforts mark a vital move toward a more resilient and wellness-focused justice system for all Illinois residents. Chicago State University is a partner and began training faculty, staff and students across campus in the Healing Centered framework to promote well-being throughout the campus.



Honoring Dr. Julian Scheinbuks, Pioneering Advocate for Student Success

Chicago State University honored nine students with the Dr. Julian Scheinbuks Scholarship Award, recognizing the late professor's visionary leadership in launching CSU's distance learning program and his generous \$1 million endowment that continues to advance student scholarships and academic innovation across the campus. The 2024-2025 scholarship recipients were Angelica Bahena, Dakota Bankole, Adaria Blackwell, Denesha Gorman, Daisy Hernandez, LaGail Jennett, Xavier Lyons, Taylor Reese, Diana Sanchez, and Trinity Thomas.



Building Global Bridges in Türkiye

In October 2024, a Chicago State University delegation—including Provost Sonja Feist-Price and senior academic leaders—traveled to Türkiye to strengthen international partnerships and represent CSU at major education conferences. During the visit, the team signed a Memorandum of Understanding, met with university and government leaders, and participated in events on cutting-edge topics such as personalized learning and global academic innovation. By connecting with Turkish institutions and influential figures, CSU is opening new pathways for global collaboration and student opportunity.

Opening Doors to Media Careers with Spark Foundry

Thirteen Chicago State University students visited Spark Foundry's downtown Chicago office for an immersive glimpse into careers in strategic media and marketing, as part of an ongoing partnership that offers a dedicated internship pipeline and a media course led by Spark Foundry each spring. Welcomed by Chief Strategy Officer Esther E.T. Franklin and CSU instructor Robyn Petit, students learned about the legacy of Leo Burnett and Spark Foundry's evolution as a leader in the field, participated in a career panel with Publicis Groupe professionals, and received personalized resume feedback from Spark Foundry's Talent Acquisition team, equipping them with practical tools and industry insight.



CSU and UChicago Forge Inclusive STEM Partnership

Chicago State and the University of Chicago have sealed a groundbreaking partnership to open more inclusive pathways in science, technology, and research for students and faculty alike. This collaborative agreement unlocks hands-on research, shared teaching initiatives, and innovative programs in fields spanning quantum science, data science, medicine, and engineering—all designed to position South Side talent at the forefront of discovery and opportunity. By centering equity in motion, both institutions are committed to breaking barriers, nurturing diverse STEM leaders, and fueling community impact for years to come.

National Security Careers Take Center Stage at CSU

President Scott Amplifies CSU's Voice

President Scott's tireless advocacy for Chicago State shaped a year defined by bold engagement and visible leadership throughout Chicago and beyond. Named a 2024 Notable Black Leader by Crain's Chicago Business, President Scott galvanized efforts for equity in higher ed—from driving policy at the Thurgood Marshall College Fund summit in D.C. to championing workforce and economic mobility at national meetings of Predominantly Black Institutions.

Her activism reached every corner of the community: she powered panels on social mobility at the Braven Summit in New York, anchored the historic Black Student Athlete Summit in Chicago, and was honored with the "Making a Difference Award" by Chicago Women in Philanthropy for deep impact in the social sector. President Scott helped strengthen public-private partnerships as a new Intersect Illinois board member, advanced economic development through CSU's university village project, and hosted civic engagement events—empowering CSU as a catalyst for student success, regional opportunity, and transformative change.

Provost Feist-Price Champions Innovation and Global Impact

This year, Provost Dr. Sonja Feist-Price elevated CSU's academic and civic leadership on national and international stages. From representing CSU at the State of the Union in Washington, to serving on the board of the pioneering Illinois Quantum and Microelectronics Park, Dr. Feist-Price advanced breakthrough research and new career pathways in STEM for CSU's diverse students.

His mission starts with recruiting the best from Chicago's high schools and galvanizing alumni, donors, and neighbors around a new point of Cougar pride.

As CSU's football program gains momentum, the university calls on the entire city to join in bringing Division I football to the South Side, fueling school spirit, boosting enrollment, and shaping Chicago's next generation of scholar-athletes and community leaders.

The CSU Women's Volleyball Team made school history by capturing the 2024 Northeast Conference Championship in their very first NEC season, earning an unprecedented NCAA Tournament bid. Led by NEC Coach of the Year Tony Trifonov and standout player Patrycja Lagida, the Cougars' powerful 13-1 run set a new milestone for excellence in CSU athletics.



NBA Referee Inspires Cougar Men's Basketball

CSU Men's Basketball welcomed NBA referee James Capers for an unforgettable visit, where he shared his expertise and championed leadership and sportsmanship among student-athletes. The event reflected CSU's commitment to preparing athletes for success beyond the game, offering unique learning opportunities from top professionals in the field.

Women's Triathlon Team Makes History in Debut Race

CSU's inaugural Women's Triathlon Team marked a major milestone by competing in their first-ever contest at North Central College, thanks to the vision and leadership of Coach Wills. This groundbreaking event is part of CSU's drive to expand athletics and provide new opportunities for student-athletes across emerging sports.



Culver Dominates as NEC Rookie Standout

Freshman sensation Aiyanna Culver has claimed the NEC/Atlantic Tomorrow's Office Rookie of the Week honor four times, highlighted by her first career double-double and impressive scoring run for CSU Women's Basketball. Averaging 14.3 points per game and consistently delivering on the court, Culver's breakout performances are energizing the Cougars and setting a high bar for newcomers.



Cougar Student-Athletes Set Academic Records

Chicago State student-athletes excelled beyond the field, with 37 Cougar athletes achieving a perfect 4.0 GPA and 96 earning above a 3.0 in Spring 2025. Ten teams posted team GPAs of 3.0 or higher, with women's volleyball leading the department at 3.82—demonstrating CSU's strong culture of academic achievement, balance, and determination.



Coach Carter Named to WBCA "Thirty Under 30" Honor Roll

CSU Assistant Women's Basketball Coach Kiara Carter was recognized as one of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association "Thirty Under 30" honorees for 2024–25, celebrating her emerging leadership in collegiate athletics. With a standout playing and coaching background from Michigan State to CSU, Carter's achievement brings pride to Cougar Nation and spotlights the rising talent shaping the future of women's basketball.

1stGEN Gala Sets New Standard for Celebration and Impact

CSU's fifth annual 1stGEN Scholarship Gala soared to record heights, bringing together over 500 leaders, sponsors, and community partners—including presenting sponsor United Airlines—to champion first-generation students and public service. The event honored trailblazers like Congressman Danny K. Davis, Valerie Jarrett, and John Atkinson, while raising vital scholarship funds and showcasing the transformational power of Cougar civic engagement and generosity.

Grant-Fueled Transformation: Scholarships, Facilities, Opportunity

Chicago State University completed renovation of four major lecture halls—thanks to \$1.285 million in philanthropic support—which now serve over 2,500 students each semester with accessible, technology-enabled spaces that boost engagement and academic excellence. The ComEd Scholars Program also continues to close tuition gaps and offer mentorship and internships to future community leaders, welcoming thirteen scholars since its 2023 launch. AT&T sustained CSU's Dual Enrollment Program for a third year, empowering 113 high school students to earn college credits and expanding outreach to boost enrollment to 200, building pathways and belonging for early college success.

BMOA's Inaugural Golf Outing Drives Scholarship Support

On September 13, 2024, the Black McDonalds Operator's Association hosted its first annual Scholarship Golf Outing at Harborside Golf Club, raising \$25,000 in scholarship support for the Chicago State Foundation. Beyond the golf course, BMOA also served as a Gold Sponsor for the 2024 1stGEN Scholarship Gala: Accelerate Presented by United and has already committed to extending its partnership into the next fiscal year. The association's generosity is helping open new doors for CSU students through expanded scholarship opportunities.

RISE Academy Champions Mentoring Excellence

In 2024-2025, CSU welcomed 146 *RISE* Academy Scholars who achieved significant academic gains—students with entry GPAs below 2.50 raised their average to 2.64, and spring persistence nearly doubled to 82%. Champion Mentors, including corporate partners, alumni, and area business leaders, provided monthly guidance and real-world insight, pairing with Scholars to nurture personal and professional growth. With financial support, holistic mentorship, and rigorous training, the Champions Program ensures every *RISE* Scholar is equipped for success, higher earning potential, and meaningful community impact.

Alumni Association Relaunch Sparks New Connections

This year, the Chicago State Alumni Association (CSAA) was reimagined and brought under the Chicago State Foundation, unlocking greater resources and support to elevate alumni experience and engagement. The reorganized CSAA features new branding, a leadership structure, a committee focus on engagement, athletics, advocacy, scholarship, and a peer mentoring program launching in FY26. Alumni membership grew by 20%, digital membership cards were introduced, and more than 700 alumni participated in 12 signature events—including a refreshed annual Alumni Breakfast and five Alumni Service Awards. With alumni accounting for 52% of individual Foundation donors and over \$110,000 given to support CSU students, the new CSAA is building a powerful, diverse community rooted in pride and partnership.

CSAA Vice-Chair Honored with Alumni Service Award for Driving Cougar Pride

Ron Lynch '88, Vice-Chair of the CSAA Athletics Committee, has been a lifelong advocate for athletics, education, and community building. A former CSU track standout who still holds school records, Ron's 40-year coaching career spans multiple high schools and now Olive Harvey Community College. Volunteering with the CSAA Board, Ron is focused on boosting alumni engagement and building a passionate fan base for Cougar athletics. Leveraging his extensive connections and dedication, Ron is poised to help drive attendance at games and elevate CSU's athletic programs—including the launch of NCAA football. This year, Ron was recognized with the Alumni Service Award for his impact on CSU Athletics and alumni engagement, ensuring Cougar pride reaches new heights.

Philanthropy in Action: Faculty and Alumni Transform Student Support

CSU is grateful for the vision and generosity of faculty and alumni who are reshaping opportunity for future graduates. Dr. Byung-In Seo, a longtime College of Education professor, made two major gifts: a five-year pledge to rehab an Ed.D. classroom and a new Doctorate of Education Student Research Fund—providing research grants so CSU's Ed.D. candidates can compete with the best.

Following his retirement, accounting alumnus and professor Vincent Osaghae, '84, and his wife launched the Vincent and Mabel Osaghae Scholarship Fund, helping CSU accounting students offset the costs of the CPA exam—a major barrier for Black and Brown graduates nationwide.

Honoring her distinguished service, Dr. Nancy Grim Hunter established a fund supporting College of Education faculty with grants for classroom technology, equipment, and materials. Collectively, these gifts help more students and faculty achieve excellence, expand access, and inspire the next generation of leaders. Dr. Nancy Grim Hunter also provided a major gift to support classroom technology upgrades that will bring the College of Education into compliance with meeting technology standards for CSU teacher candidates.

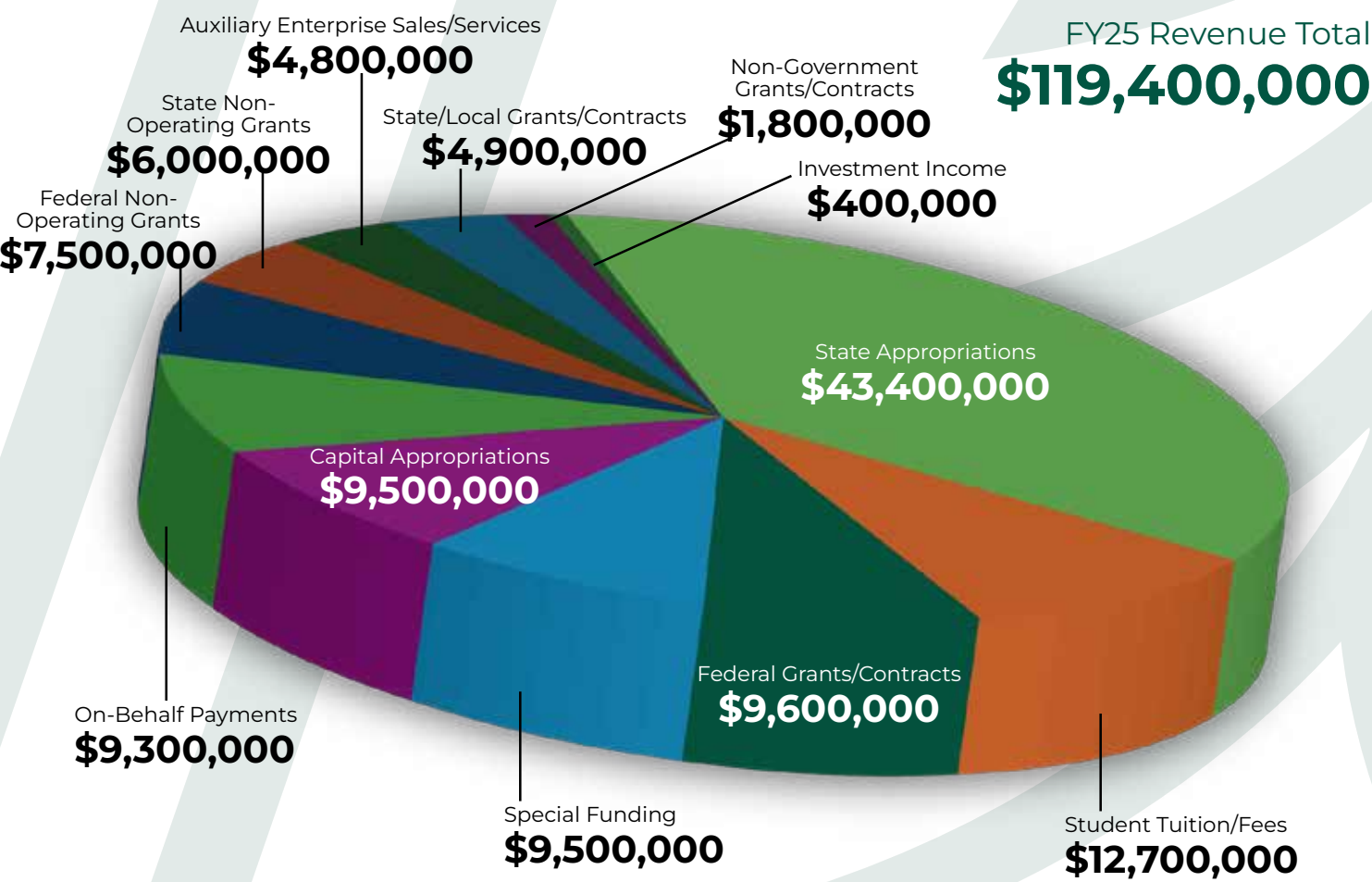

FINANCIALS

In the fiscal year 2025, CSU's expenditures from federal grant awards totaled \$17,286,978. This includes the Pell grants for \$6,041,886 and other student financial aid grants.

The expenditures for the state, municipal, and other grants added to \$11,346,236 in FY25, including the Illinois Monetary Award Program (MAP) for \$4,682,995, and other non-operating grants.

CSU currently holds 50 federal, state, municipal, and other types of grants for research, scholar activities, student support, and student training in areas ranging from health, education, and STEM to cybersecurity, athletics, and community service. These awards added to \$17,540,011 in FY25 expenditures, demonstrating the continued strength of CSU's award base.
